The number in the hospital for the past four months has fluctuated between 42 and 80 cases. The number of new cases is practically the same. The work of disinfection and vaccination is prosecuted with system and vigor.

The Cincinnati case is an immigrant from Havre, France, who left there November 12, landed in New York November 19, reached Cincinnati the 23d, and went to bed sick that day. SIR: I have the honor to report that the following concerning small-pox in this State has been received at this office during the past week: Raymond, Racine County, 1 case; Rochester, Racine County, 1 case; Milwaukee, Milwaukee County, 21 cases and 12 deaths. On hand in the city of Milwaukee at the present time: In hospitals, 38 cases; in homes, 52 cases; total, 90 cases. Nearly all new cases occur in one section, the south side of the city. The disease is not known to exist at present outside of Milwaukee and Racine counties.

Sanitary report of Rio de Janeiro.

RIO DE JANEIRO, October 30, 1894.

SIR: Inclosed find report for week ended October 27, 1894, which I have the honor to transmit: During the week there were 3 deaths from accesso pernicioso, against 6 in the foregoing week; none from yellow fever, 1 in the previous week; 1 from smallpox; 1 from typhoid fever, the same as last week; 4 from beriberi, an increase of 3; and influenza, diphtheria, and whooping cough have disappeared from the list. The total from all causes was 223, an increase of 18.

Immigrants.—A bill has been introduced in the municipal chamber to prohibit the landing of immigrants in this port from November to April every season. This is not only a necessary law to prevent the undue extension of yellow fever by unacclimated persons, but is dictated by humanity. If it shall pass in time it will be one of the many means necessary for the stamping out of the disease, but every move in this direction has always been so slow here that I am afraid nothing will be effected during the coming summer.

I have inspected and given bills of health to the following-named ships since last report: October 23, American bark Carrie Winslow, for New York; October 24, American barkentine Glad Tidings, for Baltimore, Md.; October 27, British steamship Coleridge, for New York; British bark Duncan, for Astoria, Oreg.; and British steamship Etona. for New York.

CUBA.

Yellow fever at Santiago de Cuba.

Under date of November 17, 1894, the United States consul at Santiago reports that during the week ended on that date there were 6 cases of yellow fever in the city, of which 2 were fatal. He writes:

Yellow fever in its most malignant form prevails just now. The cases taken with it usually die, the disease lasting about six days.

FRANCE.

Discontinuance of certain quarantine measures at Marseilles.

Marseilles, November 1, 1894.

SIR: I have the honor to report that, thirty days having passed since the last reported case of cholera, I have to-day discontinued the restrictions on certain merchandise required by the quarantine regulations of April 26 last. The last officially acknowledged case of cholera occurred on September 20, but there were other cases between that date and October 1, and I have deemed it wise to regard the latter date as the

beginning of the thirty days' immunity from the disease.

It is difficult to secure accurate health returns from the authorities, and never possible to obtain complete statistics for any particular month until at least one month has intervened. I have only just received and sent to the Marine-Hospital Bureau the statistics for September, and this report and that for August, the latter being issued October 1, indicate that the health conditions of Marseilles, aside from the existence of cholera, have been far from desirable. In the month of August there were 21 deaths from smallpox, 39 from typhoid fever, and 20 from diphtheria. From cholera there were, according to the official statements, 35 deaths during the month of August and 34 during September. From such information as I could secure from physicians and the hospitals, I believe there were about 150 deaths from the disease during the two months.

Unless otherwise directed, I shall continue to require disinfection of merchandise regarded as suspectible to infection, under the quarantine regulations, coming from suspicious territory, particularly Turkey and Russia, unless the same is accompanied by proper health certificates.

The baggage of the Russians only was disinfected by steam. The Laurentian proceeds to Portland to-day. All well.

VENEZUELA.

Yellow fever in Los Andes.

MARACAIBO, November 6, 1894.

SIR: Although we are here free from dangerous or contagious diseases, the town of Betizogue, in the State of Los Andes, is suffering from yellow fever. This occurred a few years ago, when I called the attention of the Department to the anomalous fact that the coast was free from fever while a mountain town was attacked, and it now appears that the same conditions prevail.

STATISTICAL REPORTS.

AFRICA—Mozambique.—Month of September, 1894. Estimated population, 10,000. Total deaths, 17. No deaths from contagious diseases.

AUSTRALIA—Sydney.—Month of September, 1894. Estimated population, 416,370. Total deaths, 401, including enteric fever, 9; scarlet fever, 9; diphtheria, 14; and whooping cough, 16.

FRANCE—Rouen.—Month of October, 1894. Estimated population, 111,847. Total deaths, 279, including phthisis pulmonalis, 49; enteric fever, 3; and croup, 10.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended November 17 corresponded to an annual rate of 17.1 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,458,442. The lowest rate was recorded in Croydon, viz, 10.7, and the highest in Newcastle-on-Tyne, viz, 26.3 a thousand.

London.—One thousand two hundred and seventy-five deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 22; scarlet fever, 8; diphtheria, 44; whooping cough, 8; enteric fever, 21; and diarrhea and dysentery, 23. The deaths from all causes corresponded to an annual rate of 16.1 a thousand. In greater London 1,642 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 14.4 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 21 from diphtheria; measles, 11; and whooping cough, 3.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended November 17 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 23.2 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Lisburn, viz, 4.3, and the highest in Sligo, viz, 35.5 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 156 deaths were registered, including smallpox, 3; enteric fever, 2; diphtheria, 1; and whooping cough, 1.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended November 17 corresponded to an annual rate of 20.3 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,447,500. The lowest mortality was recorded in Paisley, viz, 14.0, and the highest in Greenock, viz, 24.2 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 579, including smallpox, 1; measles, 12; scarlet fever, 10; diphtheria, 12; and whooping cough, 11.

GREECE—Attens.—Month of July, 1894. Estimated population, 114,000. Total deaths, 266, including typhus fever, 2; enteric fever, 13; diphtheria, 6; and measles, 39.

Month of August, 1894. Total deaths, 195, including enteric fever, 10; diphtheria, 3; measles, 13; and whooping cough, 1.

MALTA AND GOZO.—Two weeks ended September 30, 1894. Estimated population, 168,736. Total deaths, 157, including enteric fever, 3; and diphtheria, 1.

MEXICO—Acapulco.—Two weeks ended November 17, 1894. Population, 4,000. Total deaths, 9. No deaths reported from contagious diseases.

St. Helena.—Four weeks ended October 27, 1894. Population, 3,877. Total deaths, 4.
