Smallpox at Hot Springs, and Malvern, Ark.

LITTLE ROCK, ARK., *February 28, 1895.*

SIR: I have the honor to report as follows concerning the smallpox in this State: There have been at Hot Springs since February 1, 1895, 40 cases and 1 death. Two cases are at Malvern. Three cases are reported at Donaldson on the Iron Mountain Railway, 15 miles south of Malvern. The cases at Donaldson are not authenticated. In regard to the origin of the disease at Hot Springs, I have been able to obtain these facts after further investigation, and they vary from the report sent yesterday, based on the most reliable information at that time obtainable.

The first case was discovered just after the 1st of February, and was treated as a case of eczema. This case was in the person of a man from Maryville, Mo. He died on February 7, the cause of death, as given by his attending physicians, being stated in the certificate as blood poisoning. Previous to this man's death he walked the streets of Hot Springs, standing in line at the post-office general delivery, where hundreds congregated every day to receive their mail, with the eruption fully broken out. When he died his body was embalmed and shipped to his home, Maryville, Mo. Fourteen days after the body was embalmed the undertaker was taken with varioloid, and 2 negroes who assisted the undertaker developed smallpox.

The railway agent at Malvern Junction was in Hot Springs the day the first body was being embalmed, and by accident was in the undertaker's during the process. His is one of the cases at Malvern.

SIR: Your communication of the 25th ultimo, asking information concerning the smallpox situation in Madison, received. I have just returned from Madison, where, in company with Dr. Julius Kohl, a member of this board, I investigated the conditions existing, and find that 8 cases in all have occurred in the town of Madison, which is directly across the river from St. Louis; that of these 8 cases 2 have died and the others are convalescent. All precautions have been taken to prevent any further spread of the disease.

One additional case of leprosy is reported in Philadelphia, and has been placed in the leper house at the municipal hospital.

MASSACHUSETTS—*Northampton*.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 16,400. Total deaths, 19, including phthisis pulmonalis, 1; enteric fever, 1; diphtheria, 1; croup, 2; and whooping cough, 1.

Worcester.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 100,410. Total deaths, 157, including enteric fever, 1; scarlet fever, 2; diphtheria, 12; and measles, 1.

MICHIGAN.—Week ended February 23, 1895. Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, from 53 observers indicate that inflammation of kidney and inflammation of bowels increased, and that tonsillitis decreased in area of prevalence. Scarlet fever was reported present at 48 places, diphtheria at 17, enteric fever at 14, measles at 9, and smallpox at 4 places—Bengal Township, Detroit, Hamtramck, and Highland Park.

NEW JERSEY—*Hudson County*.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 318,746. Total deaths, 618, including phthisis pulmonalis, 70; enteric fever, 13; scarlet fever, 12; diphtheria, 16; and whooping cough, 3.

NEW YORK.—Month of January, 1895. Reports to the State board of health from 8 districts, including New York City, Brooklyn, and 151 other cities, towns, and villages, show a total of 10,980 deaths, including phthisis pulmonalis, 1,244; smallpox, 3; enteric fever, 108; scarlet fever, 103; diphtheria and croup, 547; measles, 34; and whooping cough, 78. The Monthly Bulletin says:

There were 10,980 deaths reported during the month, which is an estimated death rate per 1,000 population annually of 20.18 and a daily average mortality of 354, an increase of 64 deaths daily over December, when the death rate was 16.60. The total mortality is a little greater than that of January, 1894, compared with which month there were

100 more deaths from acute respiratory diseases and the same from consumption, while from common zymotic diseases there were 250 fewer deaths, the increase being in deaths from local diseases. Compared with December, 1894, there were 100 fewer deaths from zymotic diseases, but there were 1,000 more deaths attributed to acute respiratory diseases, 100 more from consumption, 200 more from diseases of the circulatory system, 100 more from old age, and 500 more from unclassified causes. The increase over December is distributed over all parts of the State, but is most marked in the maritime district, in which alone is the mortality greater than that of a year ago.

Epidemic influenza, which failed to impress the mortality of December, has caused the increase of this month, and it is estimated that there were 1,400 deaths attributed to it, or 200 more than in January, 1894, and except for it the mortality of the month would probably not have exceeded 9,565, or about the average of the past ten years. It will apparently cause a still larger mortality in February. The zymotic mortality (aside from grippe) is unusually low. Typhoid fever has decreased since December, and is the same as usual for this season. Measles is much less prevalent than a year ago. Diphtheria has not caused so few deaths in January for several years, and the number has fallen from 672 in December, which was about the average for that month, to 547, the decrease showing itself in all parts of the State. Whooping cough caused 77 deaths, and it appears to be pretty generally distributed, deaths occurring in the country as well as the cities. Other zymotic diseases show little variation. From smallpox there were 3 deaths, all in New York; there is 1 case of this disease in Utica and 2 in the town of Westchester, developing during the month. Consumption, the reported mortality from which increases during a grippe epidemic, caused 1,237 deaths, which is excessive. The mortality from local diseases from the same cause is increased, but deaths from old age have not shown the marked increase noted in January, 1894.

*Sanitary Report of Rio de Janeiro.*RIO DE JANEIRO, *February 5, 1895.*

SIR: I have the honor to transmit report for week ended February 2, 1895: There were 20 deaths from *accessio perniciosa*, an increase of 5; 5 from yellow fever, a decrease of 5; 3 from smallpox, a decrease of 4; 2 from enteric fever, a decrease of 3; 2 from beriberi; 1 from whooping cough, and 1 from cholera; 1 suspected in the foregoing week; 1 from cholera, and 2 from choleraform diarrhea, the same as in the week before. I think it possible that the cases of cholera, cholera, and diarrhea choleraformis are all the same disease. The total from all causes was 289, a decrease of 10.

Cholera.—This disease seems to be confined to the valley of the Parahyba River, and does not appear to be extending, but is about stationary as to numbers and intensity. The few cases that appear here are at once isolated and disinfected, and when possible removed to Jurijuba Bay. Up to the 4th of this month the cases I could hear of are as follows: On December 29, 3 cases, 1 removed; February 1, 3 cases, 2 deaths, and 1 removed; February 2, 1 case removed. Many reports are rife as to the cholera in the Plate River, but nothing reliable is known here.

The health of this port and town is never better than at present in this season of the year, though a great variety of zymotic diseases appear in this week's report.

Since last report the following-named ships have been inspected and received bills of health: January 29, ship *Lizzie Burrill*, British, for Sandy Hook, N. Y., and February 4, bark *Giuseppe Cappadona*, Italian, for Pensacola, Fla.

GREECE.

Smallpox at Athens and Piraeus.

In the former city, according to the police report, 21 cases in all have been noted since the appearance of the disease a few days ago, of which 9 have been fatal.

IRELAND.

Smallpox at Armagh.

Under date of February 22, 1895, the United States consul at Belfast writes that—

“At Armagh, County Armagh, some 21 miles distant, a number of smallpox cases have been reported. Energetic measures on the part of the local health officials seem to have placed the cases under control, as within the past week there have been no new outbreaks reported.”

SCOTLAND.

Smallpox in Edinburgh.

Under date of February 18, 1895, the United States consul at Edinburgh writes that—

“The outbreak of smallpox in Edinburgh has again increased. Since the 9th instant no fewer than 15 cases have been reported, many of which show symptoms of a most virulent type.”

STATISTICAL REPORTS.

BAHAMAS—*Governors Harbor*.—Two weeks ended February 16, 1895. Estimated population, 1,180. No deaths.

Green Turtle Cay—Abaco.—Two weeks ended February 13, 1895. Estimated population, 3,900. No deaths.

CUBA—*Havana*.—Under date of February 23, 1895, the United States sanitary inspector reports as follows:

There were 119 deaths in this city during the week ending February 21, 1895. Four of those deaths were caused by smallpox, 4 by enteric fever, 4 by so-called pernicious fever, 1 by diphtheria, 8 by enteritis, 2 by dysentery, 1 by the gripe, and 6 by pneumonia.

FRANCE—*Rouen*.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 111,847. Total deaths, 292, including phthisis pulmonalis, 37; enteric fever, 3; measles, 1; croup, 31; and whooping cough, 2.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales*.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended February 16 corresponded to an annual rate of 26.7 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,591,530. The lowest rate was recorded in Croydon, viz, 14.5, and the highest in Liverpool, viz, 39.6 a thousand.

London.—Two thousand four hundred and sixty-seven deaths were registered during the week, including smallpox, 1; measles, 27; scarlet fever, 18; diphtheria, 27; whooping cough, 48; enteric fever, 10; and diarrhea and dysentery, 10. The deaths from all causes corresponded to an annual rate of 21.7 a thousand. In greater London 3,092 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 26.7 a thousand of the population. In the “outer ring” the deaths included 9 from diphtheria, 6 from measles, 4 from scarlet fever, and 5 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended February 16 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 35.3 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Dundalk, viz, 16.8, and the highest in Lurgan, viz, 63.9 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 229 deaths were registered, including smallpox, 8; enteric fever, 2; diphtheria, 1; and whooping cough, 1.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended February 16 corresponded to an annual rate of 35.1 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,500,435. The lowest mortality was recorded in Perth, viz, 20.6, and the highest in Glasgow, viz, 43.0 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 1,013, including smallpox, 1; measles, 46; scarlet fever, 6; diphtheria, 6; and whooping cough, 33.
