CONNECTICUT—*Meriden*.—Month of December, 1894. Estimated population, 28,500. Total deaths, 40, including phthisis pulmonalis, 9; enteric fever, 1; scarlet fever, 1; diphtheria, 1; and whooping cough, 2.

DELAWARE—Newcastle County.—Quarter ended September 30, 1894. Population, 97,182. Total deaths, 309, including phthisis pulmonalis, 43; enteric fever, 19; scarlet fever, 1; diphtheria, 1; croup, 1; measles, 1; and whooping cough, 16.

ILLINOIS—Bloomington.—Month of December, 1894. Estimated population, 25,000. Total deaths, 17. No deaths from contagious diseases.

Chicago.—Month of November, 1894. Estimated population, 1,600,000. Total deaths, 1,633, including phthisis pulmonalis, 152; enteric fever, 38; scarlet fever, 10; diphtheria, 140; smallpox, 51; croup, 92; measles, 4; and whooping cough, 11.

Dubuque.—Month of November, 1894. Population 30,311. Total deaths, 29, including phthisis pulmonalis, 1; enteric fever, 1; diphtheria, 2; and croup, 1.

Ottumwa.—Month of November, 1894. Estimated population, 17,000. Total deaths, 23, including phthisis pulmonalis, 2; enteric fever, 9; and diphtheria, 3.

MASSACHUSETTS.—Greenville.—Month of December, 1894. Population, 8,200. Total deaths, 5. No deaths from contagious diseases.

MICHIGAN.—Week ended December 29, 1894. Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, from 52 observers, indicate that inflammation of kidney, diarrhea, and diphtheria decreased in area of prevalence. Phthisis pulmonalis was reported present during the week at 228 places; scarlet fever at 57; diphtheria at 46; enteric fever at 21; measles at 5; and smallpox at 8 places—Chester Township, Detroit, Danby Township, Marquette, and Royal Oak, Sebewa, St. Johns, and Watersmeet townships.

Grand Rapids.—Month of December, 1894. Estimated population, 80,000. Total deaths, 89, including phthisis pulmonalis, 16; enteric fever, 1; and diphtheria, 6.

NEBRASKA—Omaha.—Month of November, 1894. Population, 140,452. Total deaths, 80, including phthisis pulmonalis, 9; enteric fever, 4; scarlet fever, 2; and diphtheria and croup, 5.

NEW YORK.—Month of November, 1894. Reports to the State board of health from 8 districts, including New York City, Brooklyn, and 151 other cities, towns, and villages, show a total of 8,159 deaths, including phthisis pulmonalis, 1,022; smallpox, 10; enteric fever, 189; scarlet fever, 52; diphtheria and croup, 703; measles, 15; and whooping cough, 53.

The Monthly Bulletin says:

The reported mortality for the month has further decreased from the low daily average of 290 in October to one of 271; this is 10 less than that of the same month for the past three years, and the number of deaths is smaller than that of any month since November, 1889. This is uniformly the healthiest month in the year in this State, the average daily mortality in November being at least 25 less than the daily average for the entire year. The death rate was 15.10; in October it was 16.60, and in November, 1893, 15.35. Compared with November, 1893, the relative infant mortality is about the same, there having been fewer deaths under five years of age than in any month for several years.

The zymotic mortality has fallen from 18 per cent of the total mortality in October to about 15, which is a little less than it was a year ago. The decrease is mainly in diarrheal diseases, from which there were 500 fewer deaths than in October. From typhoid fever there was also a diminished mortality, which is customary. Diphtheria is reported as causing 700 deaths, the same number as in November for the last two years. There were 150 more than in October, which is likewise true of the two preceding years. This increase is chiefly in the maritime district, but there is a larger mortality in all parts of the State, and its increased prevalence is reported from many places. Scarlet fever caused 52 deaths, which is 20 more than in October, but fewer than have occurred in November for ten years. Epidemics of mild scarlet fever are reported from various parts of the State, causing little fatality, there being but 5 deaths outside of the cities and populous towns. In the

same rural communities there were 53 deaths from diphtheria. There were no deaths from smallpox outside the metropolis, but it developed the last of this month at Warwarsing and vicinity, originating from New York, and a number of cases have followed. Acute respiratory diseases caused fewer deaths than a year ago (1,130).

STATISTICAL REPORTS.

FRANCE—Roubaix.—Month of November, 1894. Estimated population, 120,000. Total deaths, 160, including enteric fever, 2; diphtheria, 3; measles, 1; and whooping cough, 1.

CUBA—Havana.—Under date of December 29, 1894, the United States sanitary inspector reports as follows:

There were 163 deaths in this city during the week ending December 27, 1894. Seven of those deaths were caused by yellow fever, with 17 new cases, approximately, 2 were caused by enteric fever, 3 by diphtheria, 16 by enteritis, 5 by dysentery, 7 by the grippe, and 5 by pneumonia.

INDIA—Singapore.—Month of October, 1894. Estimated population, 56,000. Total deaths, 490, including smallpox, 3; and beriberi, 13.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended December 22 corresponded to an annual rate of 18.2 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,458,442. The lowest rate was recorded in Plymouth, viz, 11.3, and the highest in Preston, viz, 26.7 a thousand.

London.—One thousand four hundred and forty-eight deaths were registered during the week, including smallpox, 1; measles, 35; scarlet fever, 14; diphtheria, 36; whooping cough, 26; enteric fever, 25; and diarrhea and dysentery, 15. The deaths from all causes corresponded to an annual rate of 17.9 a thousand. In greater London 1,870 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 16.4 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 16 from diphtheria, and 10 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended December 22 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 25.6 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Dundalk, viz, 0.0, and the highest in Lurgan, viz, 45.6 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 178 deaths were registered, including smallpox, 6; scarlet fever, 1; enteric fever, 7; and whooping cough, 5.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended December 22 corresponded to an annual rate of 21.7 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,482,767. The lowest mortality was recorded in Greenock, viz, 15.0, and the highest in Perth, viz, 25.8 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 619, including smallpox, 4; measles, 54; scarlet fever, 9; diphtheria, 10; and whooping cough, 17.

SPAIN—Barcelona.—Month of October, 1894. Population, 318,000. Total deaths, 561, including smallpox, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 85; enteric fever, 42; and diphtheria, 26.
