Relative to Entry of Vessels at St. Marys, Ga., and Points on the Satilla River.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 14, 1895.

SIR: In view of the recommendations made by Passed Assistant Surgeon L. L. Williams, through the Supervising Surgeon-General United States Marine-Hospital Service, and the lack of quarantine facilities at St. Marys, Ga., you are directed to require all vessels from foreign ports and vessels from foreign ports via domestic ports requiring disinfection, bound for St. Marys, Ga., or points on the St. Marys River or the Satilla River, to produce a certificate of pratique from either the United States quarantine station at Brunswick, Ga., or the State quarantine station at Fernandina, Fla., previous to entry.

You will notify the pilots accordingly.

Current Quarantine Measures.

[Translated in this Bureau from the "'Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes," Berlin, June 6, 1895.]

Greece.—According to advices of May 21 the twenty-four hours' quarantine of observation against Constantinople and its vicinity is discontinued.

Malta.—The quarantine ordered May 4 against Constantinople and the ports on the Sea of Marmora was suspended by proclamation of the governor on May 18.

Japan.—In view of the outbreak of cholera among the Japanese troops occupying Chinese territory, especially in the vicinity of Kinschu and the Pescadores Islands, the minister of the interior has ordered that

all vessels arriving from those localities, or points beyond those localities, either by direct route or by way of intermediate ports, shall be subject to the regulations for vessels arriving from a cholera port. These regulations require disinfection at Yokohama, at Kanagawa-Ken, at Kobe, at Hiogo-Ken, at Shimosiki, at Yamanguchi-Ken, at Nagasaki, at Nagasaki-Ken, and at Moji, at Fukuoka. The same official order requires all vessels before entering the ports of Kobe, Wadanomisaki, and Yokohama to undergo inspection by the proper authorities.

The consul-general of the German Empire at Yokohama has issued similar regulations for German vessels. German consuls at the Chinese

ports and at Singapore have been so notified.

Argentina.—By official order of May 6 Brazilian ports, with the exception of Santos, have been declared clean. Vessels arriving from said

ports shall be admitted after thorough disinfection.

Uruguay.—The strict quarantine formerly enforced against Rio de Janeiro and Santos was modified April 25 to a quarantine of seven days. Quarantine against vessels from other Brazilian ports on the Atlantic seaboard is replaced by disinfection. Passenger steamers from Rio de Janerio or Santos, which have stopped at other Brazilian ports, and which have no case of sickness on board, shall be subject only to a quarantine of detention, provided a period of ten days shall have elapsed since departure from the original port. The duration of said period of detention shall be determined by the local authorities.

CHINA—Hongkong.—By proclamation of the governor, April 23, immigration and landing of Chinese from Makao and the Island of

Hainan is prohibited.

YELLOW FEVER.

Portugal.—By ministerial order of May 25 the port of Manaas was declared clean.

BRAZIL.

Sanitary Report of Rio de Janeiro.

RIO DE JANEIRO, May 28, 1895.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit report for week ended May 25, 1895:

In this week there were 14 deaths from accesso pernicioso, an increase of 2 over the foregoing week; 23 from yellow fever, a decrease of 7; 4 from smallpox, an increase of 2; 6 from enteric fever, an increase of 3; 2 from measles, an increase of 1; 1 from whooping cough, the same as in the foregoing week; 3 from choleriform enteritis, an increase of 2; 1 from choleriform diarrhea, none in the former week; and none from cholera or cholerina. From all causes there were 343 deaths, a decrease of 15.

Yellow fever.—The deaths from this cause are gradually and steadily decreasing, just as occurred last year; the temperature appears to have little effect. I think we may safely claim that there will be no epidemic this season, though there is enough of the disease to call for great care.

Cholera.—I believe we may consider this disease as no longer a cause of alarm. No cases have been reported, though choleraic forms of intestinal diseases continue to be reported in small numbers, which may or may not mean anything. In the interior all the infected points are reported free of the disease, and sanitary measures against its advance

are no longer considered necessary or practiced. The authorities here have declared (May 25) that ships leaving Buenos Ayres after the 19th instant and Montevideo after the 22d shall not be subject to quarantine,

but will be subject to a strict sanitary inspection.

Since last report the following-named ships have been inspected or received bills of health from this office: May 21, steamship Salerno, German, for New York, from Santos; May 21, steamship Egyptian Prince, British, for New York, from Santos; May 24, steamship Sorrento, German, for New York, from Santos; May 25, bark S. R. Bearce, American, for Barbados, West Indies; May 25, barkentine White Wings, American, for Baltimore, Md.

MEXICO.

Smallpox in Minas Prietas, Sonora.

NOGALES, ARIZ., June 17, 1895.

SIR: * * * Inclosed you will find a certificate from a creditable physician, who has just arrived from Minas Prietas, Sonora, stating that there are from 300 to 400 cases of smallpox at that place, and that no precautions whatever are taken to prevent its spreading. I have, therefore, notified the superintendent that all persons coming from that camp will be detained the usual length of time before being permitted to pass this post.

STATISTICAL REPORTS.

AFRICA—Mozambique.—Month of February, 1895. Estimated population, 3,500. Total deaths, 4. No deaths from contagious diseases.

British Columbia—Victoria.—Two months ended May 31, 1895. Estimated population, 20,000. Total deaths, 43. No deaths from contagious diseases.

CUBA—Havana.—Under date of June 22, 1895, the United States assistant sanitary inspector reports as follows:

There were 171 deaths in this city during the week ended June 20, 1895. Five of these deaths were caused by yellow fever, with approximately 10 new cases; 3 were caused by enteric fever, 4 by so-called pernicious fever, 16 by enteritis, 5 by dysentery, 8 by smallpox, and 4 by pneumonia.

FRANCE—St. Etienne.—Two weeks ended June 5, 1895. Estimated population, 133,443. Total deaths, 106. No deaths reported from contagious diseases.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended June 8 corresponded to an annual rate of 15.5 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,591,530. The lowest rate was recorded in Portsmouth, viz, 10.4, and the highest in Burnley, viz, 25.7 a thousand.

London.—One thousand two hundred and forty-seven deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 36; scarlet fever, 17; diphtheria, 33; whooping cough, 22; typhus fever, 1; enteric fever, 8; and diarrhea and dysentery, 19. The deaths from all causes corresponded to an annual rate of 14.8 a thousand. In greater London 1,596 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 13.8 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 16 from diphtheria, 13 from measles, and 2 from scarlet fever.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended June 8 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 23.5 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Dundalk, viz, 4.2, and the highest in Sligo, viz, 45.7 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 148 deaths were registered, including smallpox, 3; enteric fever, 2; and whooping cough, 2.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended June 8 corresponded to an annual rate of 19.7 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,500,435. The lowest mortality was recorded in Leith, viz, 15.7, and the highest in Perth, viz, 24.0 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 567, including measles, 12; diphtheria, 1; scarlet fever, 4; and whooping cough, 11.

Jamaica—Kingston.—Month of May, 1895. Estimated population, 19,264. Total deaths, 167, including 14 from phthisis pulmonalis.

St. Helena.—Five weeks ended May 11, 1895. Estimated population, 3,877. Total deaths, 2. No deaths from contagious diseases.
