Abstract of Proceedings of the Michigan State Board of Health—Annual Meeting, April 12, 1895—Report of Dangerous Communicable Diseases and of the Condition of Health Generally in Michigan during the Quarter ended March 31, 1895.

The number of communications relative to dangerous communicable diseases, received and placed on file during the quarter, was 2,482.

The "final" reports of outbreaks received and filed during the quarter were: For diphtheria, 109; scarlet fever, 191; typhoid and typho-malarial fever, 91; measles, 21; smallpox, 12; consumption, 2. Total for the six diseases, 426.

During the quarter, the local columns of 942 newspapers have been looked over for reports of occurrence of communicable diseases. This has resulted in giving this office information of the alleged occurrence of 3 outbreaks of diphtheria, 6 outbreaks of scarlet fever, 2 outbreaks of typhoid and typho-malarial fever, and 2 outbreaks of measles. To what extent the reports of these alleged outbreaks were verified is shown in the accompanying table, giving the number of outbreaks of diphtheria, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, measles, smallpox, and consumption, from January 1 to March 31, 1895, of which notice was received at the office of the Michigan State Board of Health; the per cent of reports, information concerning which was received through the newspapers; the per cent of newspaper reports which were confirmed by the health officer; the per cent of newspaper reports which

were denied by the health officer ; and the per cent relative to which no reply was received from the health officer :

SMALLPOX IN MICHIGAN IN THE FIRST QUARTER OF 1895.

Twelve new outbreaks of smallpox were reported during the quarter. These occurred in Bengal Township, Clinton County ; Southfield Township, Oakland County ; Plymouth Village, Wayne County ; Highland Park Village, Wayne County ; Mayville Village, Tuscola County ; Pontiac City ; Royal Oak Township, Oakland County ; Hamtramck Township, Wayne County ; Grand Rapids City ; Three Rivers Village, St. Joseph County ; Ypsilanti City and Watson Township, Allegan County. Of these outbreaks, final reports of those at Bengal, Southfield, Plymouth, Pontiac, and Royal Oak, have been received. In the outbreaks at Highland Park, Ypsilanti, and Hamtramck the cases have all recovered, but no final reports of these three outbreaks have yet reached this office at this date (April 1, 1895). Relative to the alleged outbreaks at Mayville and Three Rivers, no reports have been received at this office at this date (April 1, 1895), from either of these localities since the "blue letter" was sent from this office, and it is inferred that there may have been no smallpox at either of these localities. (This has since been found to be true.)

April 1, smallpox is still present at Detroit, Grand Rapids, and Watson Township.

The outbreak which began in Detroit in May, 1894, still continues. During the quarter ended March 31, 1895, there have occurred in that city, 77 new cases, and 26 deaths, which, with the 17 cases that were still sick at the close of the quarter ended December 31, 1894, make a total of 94 cases and 26 deaths, during the first quarter of 1895.

(From the beginning of the outbreak in May, 1894, up to April 1, 1895, there have occurred in the city of Detroit 217 cases and 60 deaths.)

In the ten outbreaks of smallpox, not including Detroit, and from which reports have been received during the quarter ended March 31, 1895, there have occurred 21 cases and only 1 death.

In the five outbreaks, relative to which final reports have been received, the infection was in every instance restricted to the one house in which it first occurred.

Smallpox at Eagle Pass, Tex., Among Negroes Coming from Mexico.

EAGLE PASS, TEX., July 29, 1895.

Two hundred destitute negroes from Mexico arrived here in past few days, 15 cases of smallpox among them. State authorities have them in quarantine. Have instructed the inspectors to cooperate with State officers and assist them if called upon. More infected negroes expected to arrive. Wire instructions, if any.

EAGLE PASS, TEX., July 31, 1895.

Two hundred and forty-four negroes in quarantine at Eagle Pass; 15 arrived yesterday, with 3 cases of smallpox; total cases developed, 18; railway company notifies me 200 negroes leave Torreon for Eagle Pass to-day. It is reported that 40 are sick. * * * Negroes not vaccinated, and shipped in crowded box cars. There is danger of negroes stampeding and escaping to interior unless great precautions are taken.

AUSTIN, TEX., July 30, 1895.

The negro colonists—200—are in quarantine camp 4 miles from Eagle Pass, this side of the Rio Grande. Those sick with smallpox are isolated, and all receiving the attention that humanity and sanitation require.

Ottumwa.—Month of June, 1895. Estimated population, 17,000. Total deaths, 15, including phthisis pulmonalis, 2.

MASSACHUSETTS—*Fitchburg*.—Month of June, 1895. Estimated population, 29,383. Total deaths, 18, including 3 from phthisis pulmonalis.

MICHIGAN.—Week ended July 30, 1895. Reports to the State board of health from 56 observers indicate that dysentery and whooping cough increased, and pleuritis, inflammation of the kidney, influenza, tonsilitis, erysipelas, and bronchitis decreased in area of prevalence.

TENNESSEE.—Month of June, 1895. Reports to the State board of health from 7 cities and towns, having an aggregate population of 205,204, show a total of 286 deaths, including phthisis pulmonalis, 41; diphtheria, 1; measles, 2; and whooping cough, 3.

Yellow Fever in Havana.

HAVANA, CUBA, July 20, 1895.

SIR: In confirmation of my telegram of the 19th instant, informing you that "yellow fever had within the last few days increased considerably among civilians," I have now the honor to say that there were 18 deaths from that disease during the week ended July 18, and that a larger part of them occurred during the last 3 days of that week. As all of those deaths were among civilians in different parts of the town, and none among soldiers, it indicates a tendency in the disease to spread in the city. Up to the present time very few of the recently arrived soldiers from Spain stay in the city a longer time than sufficient to be formed into battalions, get clothing, etc., and be forwarded to the territory of the insurrection.

Sanitary Inspection of Cuban Ports.

HAVANA, CUBA, July 23, 1895.

SIR: In obedience to your telegraphic instructions of the 19th instant, I have the honor to inform you that Dr. Enrique Fortun started on the 21st instant to inspect the following ports on the north coast of this island, viz, Matanzas, Cardenas, Sagua la Grande, and Caibarien. From the latter port he will probably cross the island to the south side to inspect Cienfuegos, Casilda de Trinidad, perhaps Tunas de Zaza, the port for Sancti-Espiritu, in the province of Santa Clara, and Batabano. From Matanzas he has sent me the inclosed report in regard to his inspection of that place on the 21st instant, in which you will see he says that in the three civil hospitals of that city, with their 125 patients, he found 1 case of yellow fever—a 16-year-old boy, a native of Jerusalem. In the military hospital, with 90 patients, there were 3 well-marked cases of yellow fever of moderate intensity, and a large number of cases of malarial fever among the recently arrived troops, in which such a slow pulse and subicteric hue of the conjunctiva was found in some cases that it caused him to doubt the correctness of the diagnosis of malaria and suspect yellow fever.

The fact that there are but few troops in Matanzas who are not acclimated, and scarcely any of the civil population who have not immunity to yellow fever, and the financial prostration of the place offering no inducements to immigration, accounts in a measure for the small

number of cases of yellow fever there at present. The physicians in private practice with whom he conversed had then no cases of yellow fever.

The disease which is causing greatest havoc among all classes is dysentery, and there it rages in an epidemic form, many cases of the disease being in the hospitals above alluded to, as well as in private practice.

The number of deaths in all in the place from July 1 to the 20th were 106, 23 of which were from dysentery.

Only 6 small vessels were in the harbor, 1 of which was at the wharf.

Dr. Fortun was to leave Matanzas on the 22d instant for Cardenas.

STATISTICAL REPORTS.

CUBA—Havana.—Under date of July 27, 1895, the United States sanitary inspector reports as follows :

There were 145 deaths in this city during the week ended July 25, 1895. Twenty-three of these deaths were caused by yellow fever, with approximately 70 new cases; 4 were caused by enteric fever, 4 by so-called pernicious fever, 1 by paludal fever, 7 by enteritis, 3 by dysentery, 4 by smallpox, 1 by pneumonia, and 1 by glanders.

FRANCE—Nice.—Month of June, 1895. Estimated population, 97,720. Total deaths, 148, including phthisis pulmonalis, 11; and enteric fever, 3.

Roubaix.—Month of June, 1895. Estimated population, 120,000. Total deaths, 211, including enteric fever, 1; diphtheria, 3; whooping cough, 2; and cholera, 6 (reported as *not Asiatic* cholera).

Rouen.—Month of June, 1895. Estimated population, 111,847. Total deaths, 242, including enteric fever, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 34; and croup, 11.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended July 13 corresponded to an annual rate of 19.9 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,591,530. The lowest rate was recorded in Huddersfield, viz, 8.9, and the highest in Liverpool, viz, 30.2 a thousand.

London.—One thousand seven hundred and sixty-eight deaths were registered during the week, including smallpox, 1; measles, 75; scarlet fever, 20; diphtheria, 50; whooping cough, 19; enteric fever, 11; and diarrhea and dysentery, 270. The deaths from all causes corresponded to an annual rate of 17.8 a thousand. In greater London 2,229 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 19.2 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 17 from measles and 22 from diphtheria.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended July 13 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 19.9 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Lurgan, viz, 0.0, and the highest in Wexford, viz,

36.1 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 134 deaths were registered, including enteric fever, 3; diphtheria, 1; and smallpox, 2.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended July 13 corresponded to an annual rate of 20.3 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,500,435. The lowest mortality was recorded in Dundee, viz, 15.3, and the highest in Paisley, viz, 32.0 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 585, including scarlet fever, 6; measles, 14; diphtheria, 1; and whooping cough, 18.

JAMAICA—Kingston.—Month of June, 1895. Estimated population, 19,264. Total deaths, 117, including phthisis pulmonalis, 14; and enteric fever, 4.

MALTA AND GOZO.—Two weeks ended May 31, 1895. Estimated population, 171,571. Total deaths, 182. No deaths reported from contagious diseases.

RUSSIA—Riga.—Month of April, 1895. Estimated population, 215,000. Total deaths, 378, including smallpox, 1; enteric fever, 1; scarlet fever, 1; diphtheria, 1; measles, 1; and whooping cough, 1.

SPAIN—Barcelona.—Month of May, 1895. Estimated population, 318,000. Total deaths, 614, including smallpox, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 110; enteric fever, 21; diphtheria, 28; and measles, 50.

Month of June, 1895. Total deaths, 611, including smallpox, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 96; enteric fever, 9; diphtheria, 13; and measles, 20.

ST. HELENA.—Four weeks ended June 8, 1895. Estimated population, 3,877. One death. No deaths from contagious diseases.

SWITZERLAND—Lucerne.—Month of June, 1895. Estimated population, 22,000. Total deaths, 21. No deaths from contagious diseases.
