Vessels from Cholera-Infected Ports Sent to Angel Island Quarantine.

SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., *September 17, 1895.*

Steamship *Rio Janeiro*, from Hongkong, via Yokohama, 8 days from Honolulu, bark *Allen S. C.*, 19 days from Honolulu, sent to quarantine yesterday for disinfection. No sickness on either during passage.

Pacific Coast Quarantine—Statement.

Every port of entry on the Pacific coast has been inspected this season by a regular marine-hospital officer, and compliance with the Treasury regulations insisted on. The Marine-Hospital Service performs the inspection, and has the management of the quarantine establishments at Port Townsend, Wash., and at San Diego, Cal. At San Francisco (Angel Island) there is a complete quarantine plant belonging to the service, with a medical officer in command, equipped with the most recent appliances for disinfection. Passed-Assistant Surgeon Roseneau was ordered to report to the medical officer in command at this station, September 16, and has been supplied with necessary apparatus for bacteriological diagnosis. Inspection is at present performed by the local quarantine officer, and the quarantine certificate presented to the collector of customs certifies that the Treasury regulations have been complied with.

Sanitary inspectors of the Marine-Hospital Service have been appointed at Grays Harbor and Wilippa, South Bend, Wash.

At Astoria, Oreg., at the mouth of the Columbia River, the inspection is done by a state health office, in conformity with Treasury regulations.

Coos Bay (Empire City), Gardner, and Yaquina City, the remaining ports of Oregon, have all been inspected.

At Eureka, Cal., a sanitary inspector of the Marine-Hospital Service is quarantine officer.

The United States consul at Yokohama has a sanitary inspector to assist in the inspection of vessels, and the consul-general at Honolulu has been authorized to employ a physician for the same purpose.

Smallpox at Wheeling, W. Va.

MARTINSBURG, *September 13, 1895.*

SIR: In reply to your letter of inquiry, dated September 12, I have to say that there is an epidemic of smallpox in Wheeling. Report of the outbreak was made to the secretary only yesterday, through the confusion caused by a change of health officers by the city of Wheeling.

just at the beginning of the scare; hence it was impossible to give earlier notification of the presence of the disease at that place. The secretary (Dr. Baker) is now in Wheeling, and will give you a particular account of the situation on his return. Twenty cases in all are reported at Wheeling. Source of disease not ascertained. Measures adopted to suppress it are vigorous isolation and guarding of all cases and suspects.

There is no report of any outbreak of smallpox at Parkersburg, and as the local board of health at that place is very efficient, it is believed that no unreported outbreak exists.

SIR: In reply to your favor of 12th instant, concerning outbreak of smallpox in the city of Wheeling, I am glad to be able to inform you that it is not as bad as at first reported. I spent Saturday, the 14th, in making a personal investigation of the cases (28 in number) and the means taken to control the outbreak. Everything was so satisfactory that I at once issued a proclamation raising quarantines in the neighboring towns against the city of Wheeling.

Phthisis pulmonalis was reported present at 180 places, scarlet fever at 25, enteric fever at 58, diphtheria at 21, whooping cough at 10, measles at 7, and smallpox at 4 places—Battle Creek, Bedford Township, Charleston Township, and Detroit.

Current Quarantine Measures.

[Translated in this Bureau from the "Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes," Berlin, August 28, 1895.]

Turkey.—The superior council of health of Constantinople has ordered a 48 hours' quarantine of observation to be enforced at the lazaretto of Tuzla after August 12, against all passenger vessels arriving from ports on the Sea of Marmora between Bay-Burnon and Kara Bayha. Vessels not carrying passengers shall be subject only to strict medical inspection.

Egypt.—The international council of health resolved, August 7, that with the departure of the steamer *Narghileh* under free pratique, which took place August 11, the pilgrim season for this year should be declared closed, the quarantine regulations with regard to the return of pilgrims out of force, and the quarantine raised. At a later meeting, August 14, the quarantine measures against arrivals from the ports between Cape Anamur and Alexandretta were made to include Suidige.

Phillipine Islands.—Advices of July 24 state that quarantine has been declared at Manila against arrivals from Singapore.

East Indies.—By resolution of the government of Bombay, July 22, quarantine measures were again ordered to be put in force in the ports of Aden, Perim and the Samali coast against all vessels arriving from the Arabian ports of the Red Sea, or having had intercourse with vessels from said ports of the Red Sea.

Quarantine Against Plague.

Straits Settlements.—By proclamation of the governor, July 18, the quarantine measures put in force May 8 against arrivals from Macao were suspended.

Cholera Notes.

[Translated in this Bureau from the "Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes," Berlin, August 28, 1895.]

France.—The weekly bulletin of municipal statistics, No. 33, reports 8 cases of choleric form affections in 6 quarters of Paris from August 11 to 17.

Turkey.—A fatal case of cholera is reported at Constantinople in the Balat quarter (Golden Horn) under date of August 8.

In the vilayet of Hudavendkjar the epidemic shows a notable increase, while in the vilayet of Angora it is apparently extinct. Cases and deaths are reported as follows: In 4 quarters of the vilayet of Hudavendkjar from July 27 to August 12, 24 cases, 22 deaths; in 10 quarters of the vilayet of Adana from July 23 to August 10, 105 cases, 49 deaths; in two localities of the vilayet of Rania from July 21 to August 12, 32 cases, 16 deaths; in Aleppo, from July 28 to August 12, 264 cases, 93 deaths; and in 14 localities of the vilayet of Aleppo, from July 24 to August 12, 98 cases, 57 deaths; in Diarbekir, from August 5 to 12, 83 cases, 66 deaths; in Hisni-Mansur (vilayet Mamurat el Aziz), from July 28 to August 10, 87 cases, 69 deaths; and in Homs (vilayet of Damascus), on August 9, 1 case and 1 death.

EAST INDIES—Calcutta.—From August 14 to 20, 26 cholera deaths occurred.

BRAZIL.

Sanitary Report of Rio de Janeiro.

RIO DE JANEIRO, August 20, 1895.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit report for the week ended August 17, 1895:

There were 6 deaths from *accessio pernicioso*, a decrease of 6; 8 from yellow fever, an increase of 1; 67 from smallpox, a decrease of 1; 1 from beriberi; 4 from enteric fever; 3 from measles; 37 from tuberculosis, a decrease of 5, and none from whooping cough. There were 388 deaths from all causes, which is an increase of 26 over the foregoing week.

Yellow fever.—I can give no good reason for this disease continuing as it does, though the cases are fewer, the fact is, it is always here.

Smallpox.—This disease can be considered as stationary; the last three days of the week it diminished considerably, but since then the numbers have gone up again.

Since last report the following-named ships have been inspected or received bills of health from this office: August 16, 1895, bark (4 masts) *Simla*, for San Francisco, Cal. August 17, 1895, steamship *Galileo*, Belgian, for New York.

Case of the Adelina.—On the 14th of the month a Portuguese captain appeared at my office and asked for a bill of health for his ship for Philadelphia via Pernambuco. As, according to the regulations, in

face of the reigning epidemic of smallpox, I am requiring all crews and passengers for the United States to be vaccinated unless they show good scars or smallpox marks, I told him he must first prove the fact before receiving a bill of health. He went off to bring his crew and never appeared again, and on the 16th I saw announced in the morning paper, the *O Paiz*, that the Portuguese bark *Adelina*, Captain Joaquin Francisco da Silva, had sailed in ballast on the 15th for Philadelphia and Pernambuco.

SANDWICH ISLANDS.

*Cholera at Honolulu.*WASHINGTON, D. C., *September 13, 1895.*

The Department of State is in receipt of a telegram, dated September 12, from the dispatch agent at San Francisco, forwarding the following statement, dated September 5, from the consul-general at Honolulu :

Since outbreak of cholera August 9, 39 cases; 32 deaths to noon to-day.

STATISTICAL REPORTS.

BAHAMAS—*Dunmore Town.*—Two weeks ended August 26, 1895. Estimated population, 1,472. One death. No deaths from contagious diseases.

Governors Harbor.—Two weeks ended August 31, 1895. Estimated population, 1,185. One death. No deaths from contagious diseases.

Green Turtle Cay—Abaco.—Two weeks ended August 29, 1895. Estimated population, 3,900. No deaths.

CUBA.—Under dates of September 7 and 14, 1895, the United States sanitary inspector, M. H. S., at Habana, reports as follows :

There were 676 deaths in this city during the month of August, 1895. One hundred and sixteen of those deaths were caused by yellow fever, 21 by enteric fever, 22 by so-called pernicious fever, 4 by paludal fever, 1 by bilious fever, 1 by diphtheria, 33 by enteritis, 6 by dysentery, 16 by smallpox, 1 by scarlet fever, 1 by measles, 15 by pneumonia, and 4 by glanders.

During the week ending September 5 there were 155 deaths, 26 of which were caused by yellow fever with 80 new cases approximately. 3 were caused by enteric fever, 8 by so-called pernicious fever, 1 by paludal fever, 3 by enteritis, 3 by dysentery, and 2 by smallpox. Ten of the 26 deaths by yellow fever during the week occurred in the military hospital, which is an increase of mortality from that disease in that institution and a corresponding decrease in the city at large.

There were 129 deaths in this city during the week ending September 12, 1895.

Twenty-eight of those deaths were caused by yellow fever, with approximately 90 new cases; 4 were caused by so-called pernicious fever, 6 by enteritis, 7 by dysentery, 1 by smallpox, and 4 by pneumonia.

Six of the 28 deaths by yellow fever occurred in the military hospital, the remaining 22 in various parts of the city.

FRANCE—*Rouen.*—Month of July, 1895. Estimated population 115,000. Total deaths, 293, including phthisis pulmonalis, 30; enteric fever, 4; croup, 5; and whooping cough, 1.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales.*—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended August 31 corresponded to an annual rate of 19.9 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,591,530. The lowest rate was recorded in Bristol, viz, 14.2, and the highest in Burnley, viz, 31.6 a thousand.

London.—One thousand three hundred and thirty-six deaths were registered during the week, including smallpox, 4; measles, 56; scarlet fever, 21; diphtheria, 40; whooping cough, 22; enteric fever, 10; typhus fever, 1; diarrhea and dysentery, 122, and 2 from cholera (presumably “cholera nostra.”) The deaths from all causes corresponded to an annual rate of 17.3 a thousand. In greater London 1,756 deaths were registered corresponding to an annual rate of 15.1 a thousand of the population. In the “outer ring” the deaths included 10 from measles, 14 from diphtheria, and 5 from scarlet fever.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended August 31 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 20.4 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Lisburn, viz, 4.3, and the highest in Newry, viz, 36.2 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 158 deaths were registered, including enteric fever, 5, and whooping cough, 3.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended August 31 corresponded to an annual rate of 17.3 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,500,435. The lowest mortality was recorded in Paisley, viz, 13.8, and the highest in Perth, viz, 24.0 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 499, including scarlet fever, 8; measles, 5; diphtheria, 5; and whooping cough, 12.

INDIA—Singapore.—Month of June, 1895. Estimated population, 56,000. Total deaths, 1,208, including 80 from cholera and 67 from beriberi.

MADAGASCAR—Mozambique.—Month of April, 1895. Estimated population, 8,000. Total deaths, 6. No deaths from contagious diseases.

Month of May, 1895. Total deaths, 2. No deaths from contagious diseases.

Month of June, 1895. Total deaths, 6. No deaths from contagious diseases.

ST. HELENA.—Four weeks ended August 3, 1895. Estimated population, 3,877. Total deaths, 9. No deaths from contagious diseases.
