On hand in city of Milwaukee at present time: In Eleventh Ward Hospital, 13 cases; in Eighteenth Ward Hospital, 7 cases; in homes, 42 cases; total, 62 cases. Patients are not removed from homes, when objection is raised, on account of an ordinance passed by the city council.

California.—Month of December, 1894. Reports to the State board of health, from 77 cities, towns, and villages, having an aggregate population of 791,223, show a total of 1,061 deaths, including phthisis pulmonalis, 180; enteric fever, 36; scarlet fever, 1; diphtheria, 18; measles, 2; and whooping cough, 2.

Oakland.—Month of December, 1894. Estimated population, 60,000. Total deaths, 111, including phthisis pulmonalis, 6; enteric fever, 1; and diphtheria, 3.

San Francisco.—Month of December, 1894. Estimated population, 330,000. Total deaths, 522, including phthisis pulmonalis, 90; enteric fever, 20; diphtheria, 1; eroup, 2; and measles, 2.

CONNECTICUT.—Month of December, 1894. Reports to the State board of health from 168 towns, having an aggregate population of 813,257, show a total of 1,054 deaths, including phthisis pulmonalis, 125; enteric fever, 33; scarlet fever, 7; diphtheria and croup, 55; measles, 2; and whooping cough, 10.

FLORIDA.—Week ended January 12, 1895. Estimated population, 459,841. Total deaths, 72, including phthisis pulmonalis, 7; and enteric fever, 4.

INDIANA—Evansville.—Month of December, 1894. Estimated population, 60,000. Total deaths, 75, including phthisis pulmonalis, 11; enteric fever, 2; diphtheria, 1; and croup, 1.

MASSACHUSETTS—Brockton.—Month of December, 1894. Estimated population, 30,000. Total deaths, 23, including phthisis pulmonalis, 9; scarlet fever, 5; diphtheria and croup, 3; and whooping cough, 2.

MICHIGAN.-Week ended January 12, 1895. Reports to the State

board of health from 56 observers indicate that remittent fever, pleuritis, scarlet fever, and diarrhea increased, and that inflammation of the kidney decreased in area of prevalence. Phthisis pulmonalis was reported present during the week at 228 places, scarlet fever at 61, diphtheria at 32, enteric fever at 29, measles at 7, and smallpox at 10—Bengal and Chester townships, Detroit, Highland Park, Marquette, Plymouth, and St. Johns, Sebewa, Southfield, and Watersmeet townships.

MINNESOTA—*Minneapolis*.—Month of December, 1894. Estimated population, 223,700. Total deaths, 163, including phthisis pulmonalis, 20 enteric fever, 6; searlet fever, 1; diphtheria, 5; and whooping cough, 1.

# FOREIGN.

[Reports received from the United States consuls through the Department of State and from other sources.]

Current Quarantine Measures against Cholera.

[From the Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes, Berlin, January 3, 1895.]

Prussia.—Under date of December 21, 1894, the state health commissioner of the provinces or the Vistula discontinued sanitary inspection at Tolkemit.

Roumania.—At a cabinet meeting, December 14, 1894, sanitary police measures, adopted August 20, 1894, with regard to persons arriving from Russia and Bessarabia were suspended; said suspension to take effect December 19, 1894.

Turkey.—Advices of December 13 state that the ten days' quarantine against arrivals from points on the Gulf of Adalia, east of Anamur, shall extend to Tomoue, near Mersine, but not to Mersine.

Egypt.—The international sanitary council, in a sitting of December 2, 1894, allowed free pratique to arrivals from ports on the Gulf of Adalia, east of Anamur, when the report of medical inspection shall be satisfactory, and when fully five days shall have elapsed since departure from the infected region.

Uruguay.—All German ports have been officially declared free and

quarantine restrictions against the same removed.

The sanitary authorities have further ordered that all vessels leaving the ports of Rio de Janeiro and Santos on or after November 25 shall undergo thorough inspection at the island of Flores, and all soiled effects on said vessels shall be disinfected. Vessels bound for Buenos Ayres or the west coast of the river shall remain in quarantine at Montevideo. Vessels from Rio de Janeiro or Santos are, by official order of December 5, subject to eight days' quarantine. Passengers and crews from other ports in Brazil shall be subject to medical inspection, and the effects of suspected persons to disinfection.

The authorities have furthermore declared the ports of the Netherlands and Belgium to be clean, and that vessels arriving from said ports shall be allowed free pratique on and after December 15 and 18 respect-

ively.

Argentina.—By official order of November 24, German ports in general are declared clean; ships arriving from said ports after December 6 shall be allowed pratique. The special regulations in force against Hamburg and Bremen are not affected by this order.

## Quarantine Measures against Plague.

German Empire.—By official order of the Imperial chancellor, addressed to the authorities of seaport towns, the sanitary restrictions on arrivals from southern China, more especially from Hongkong and Macao, are declared no longer in force.

#### BRAZIL.

Sanitary Report of Rio de Janeiro for Week Ended December 15, 1894.

RIO DE JANEIRO, December 18, 1894.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit report for week ended December 15, 1894. There were 7 more deaths in this week than in the previous one, though the number is still very low for the season. There was no death from yellow fever; 8 from accesso pernicioso, an increase of 4; 3 from smallpox, an increase of 1; 2 from beriberi, one in the previous week, and none from typhoid fever or diphtheria.

Cholera.—As far as I can learn, this disease is declining both in numbers and virulence along the infected district. The Government has established hospitals or lazarettos at several stations of the railway, 11 in all, I think, and the following is the report from them: On the 13th, 28 cases and 5 deaths; on the 14th, 25 cases and 3 deaths; on the 16th, 13 cases and 2 deaths. Of course, these numbers do not include cases occurring on the plantations in the surrounding country, many of which have been invaded by the cholera.

Both the State and Federal Governments have numerous physicians and sanitary inspectors in the district, who not only make visits to the infected plantations where they have reported cases, but are constantly making domiciliary visits to verify the sanitary condition. Traffic has been reopened restrictedly with the interior, but every train bears its sanitary inspector and physician, and all passengers are inspected and disinfected, with their baggage, before leaving the cars. Floriano Peixoto, ex President, did not escape the ordeal a few days ago. No cases have appeared either in this town or port, nor do I think we need fear an invasion if the authorities continue their present energetic proceedings of inspection, disinfection, and isolation. Of course, many persons escape without detection, which is the one source of danger.

As some of these may wish to embark at this port for other countries, the inspector-general of health of the port has issued an order to all persons from the interior who wish to embark here to appear at his office for examination twenty four hours before sailing. Passenger lists are verified daily, and as the names and addresses of all passengers from the interior are daily sent to his office, it is difficult for any to escape.

The mortality has been from 40 to 50 per cent, and, strange to say, not one female has escaped death. Quarantine has been declared here against vessels from the Plate River, especially Santa Fé and Rosario. The Chilean Government has also declared the Argentine ports to be infected. I should have said above that the disease is believed to be

extinct at Barra Mansa, where it was most developed.

Since last report the following-named ships have been inspected and received bills of health from this office: December 11, steamship Galileo, British, for New York; and bark Jacob A. Stamlar, American, for Brunswick, Ga. December 12, bark Julia Rollins, American, for Baltimore, Md. December 14, steamship Kenneth, British, for Nateo and ports north of Hatteras. December 15, bark Sereia, Portuguese, for New Orleans, La. December 17, bark Virginia, American, for Savanna, Ga.; and steamship Ptolemy, British, for New York; and December 18, steamship Mexican Prince, from Santos for New York.

## Smallpox in Dublin.

The United States consul at Dublin reports that during the week ended January 11, 1895, there were 291 cases of smallpox (of which 16 were fatal) in that city. He adds:

While smallpox has not as yet been declared epidemic by the authorities, yet, due to the rapid increase in the past two weeks, this consulate is now taking such measures in reference to shipments, etc., as if epidemic.

#### TURKEY IN ASIA.

## Suspicious epidemic at Diarbekir.

BAGDAD, November 29, 1894.

SIR: A communication from the sanitary department, dated November 20, but delivered too late for last mail, informs me that an epidemic of cholera morbus has broken out in Diarbekir, and that to protect Mosul and Lower Mesopotamia a sanitary cordon has been established.

Whether it is cholera morbus or Asiatic cholera or anything at all that has broken out, I will not presume to say. \* \* \* While there has been no epidemic of cholera in Bagdad and Bassorah this last summer, there have been several isolated cases, one a member of the quarantine service; but the disease has been called by another name, though all the physicians in attendance have privately agreed as to the diagnosis.

#### STATISTICAL REPORTS.

AUSTRALIA.—Sydney.—Month of October, 1894. Estimated population, 416,370. Total deaths, 444, including enteric fever, 5; diphtheria, 7; and whooping cough, 9.

CUBA.—Havana.—Under date of January 12, 1895, the United States sanitary inspector reports as follows:

There were 155 deaths in this city during the week ending January 10, 1895. Three of those deaths were caused by yellow fever with 8 new cases approximately, 2 were caused by enteric fever, 1 by so-called pernicious fever, 3 by enteritis, 2 by dysentery, 1 by smallpox, 5 by the grippe, 5 by pneumonia, and 1 by glanders.

FRANCE—Roubaix.—Month of December, 1894. Estimated population, 120,000. Total deaths, 186, including cholera, 3; typhus fever, 1; enteric fever, 4; diphtheria, 3; measles, 1; and whooping cough, 3.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registreed in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended January 5, corresponded to an annual rate of 18.9 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,591,530. The lowest rate was recorded in Cardiff, viz, 14.1, and the highest in Gateshead, viz, 25.0 a thousand.

London.—One thousand four hundred and sixty-two deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 34; scarlet fever, 14; diphtheria, 50; whooping cough, 23; enteric fever, 17; and diarrhea and dysentery, 14. The deaths from all causes corresponded to an annual rate of 17.4 a thousand. In greater London 1,897 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 16.4 a thousand of the population. In the "outer-ring" the deaths included 18 from diphtheria, 7 from whooping cough, and 8 from measles.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths

registered during the week ended January 5 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 24.6 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Kilkenny, viz, 4.7, and the highest in Sligo, viz, 35.5 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 190 deaths were registered, including smallpox, 5; enteric fever, 2; and whooping cough, 1.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended January 5, corresponded to an annual rate of 21.8 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,500,435. The lowest mortality was recorded in Paisley, viz, 13.8, and the highest in Glasgow, viz, 24.6 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 630, including smallpox, 2; measles, 38; scarlet fever, 8; diphtheria, 11; and whooping cough, 9.

NORFOLK ISLAND.—Month of October, 1894. Estimated population, 792. One death.
