### *One case of Yellow Fever on the Steamship Boskenna Bay at South Atlantic Quarantine Station.*

SOUTH ATLANTIC QUARANTINE STATION, *October 6, 1895.*

SIR: Confirming my telegram of this date, I have the honor to report the arrival, on the evening of the 5th instant, of the Austrian steamship *Boskenna Bay*, from Habana to Savannah, Ga., four days out, with the master convalescent from and one member of the crew ill with yellow fever. No connection can be traced between the two cases, and independent infection is suspected. The case, being too ill in my opinion to be removed, has been isolated on board ship, an immune attendant put with him as nurse, and the acting assistant surgeon stationed at the North End in charge.

The ship being exceptionally filthy for an iron steamship, holds, cabin, forecastle, and all fabrics have been subjected to preliminary disinfection by sulphur fumigation, and on the termination of the case routine practice will be followed.

It is difficult to derive any definite information as to exposure of crew in Habana, but little English and no German being spoken on board, master, officers, and crews being all Italians by geographical situation, though claiming Austrian nationality.

### *Smallpox in Nevada.*

CARSON, NEV., *September 17, 1895.*

Three cases of smallpox broke out in the Carson (Nevada) Indian training school on the 15th instant, and 2 more developed on the 17th.

The type is discrete, and no serious results are apprehended. The school is situated 3 miles south of Carson, and is now in quarantine, and the patients are in the pesthouse. The pupils had just returned from their summer vacation, and the origin of these cases is unknown, as no other cases have been reported throughout the State.

CONNECTICUT—*Meriden*.—Month of September, 1895. Estimated population, 25,423. Total deaths, 37, including phthisis pulmonalis, 5; and enteric fever, 1.

*Westport*.—Month of September, 1895. Estimated population, 4,000. Total deaths, 7. No deaths from contagious diseases.

IOWA—*Keokuk*.—Month of September, 1895. Estimated population, 18,000. Total deaths, 12, including 2 from enteric fever.

GEORGIA—*Columbus*.—Month of September, 1895. Estimated population, white, 10,276; colored, 9,027; total, 19,303. Deaths, white, 13; colored, 20; total, 33, including 7 from phthisis pulmonalis.

MASSACHUSETTS—*Malden*.—Month of September, 1895. Estimated population, 33,000. Total deaths, 37, including phthisis pulmonalis, 2; and diphtheria, 1.

*Newton*.—Month of September, 1895. Estimated population, 27,622. Total deaths, 22, including croup, 1; and diphtheria, 3.

MICHIGAN.—Week ended September 28, 1895. Reports to the State board of health from 60 observers indicate that tonsillitis and inflammation of bowels increased and intermittent fever decreased in area of prevalence. Phthisis pulmonalis was reported present during the week at 179 places, enteric fever at 81, scarlet fever at 28, diphtheria at 27, measles at 2, whooping cough at 7, and smallpox at 4 places—Battle Creek, Battle Creek Township, Bedford Township, and Detroit.

MINNESOTA—*Winona*.—Month of September, 1895. Estimated population, 21,000. Total deaths, 23, including 3 from phthisis pulmonalis.

NEW YORK.—Month of August, 1895. Reports to the State board of health from 8 districts, including New York City, Brooklyn, and 153 other cities, towns, and villages, show a total of 11,050 deaths, including

phthisis pulmonalis, 1,051; enteric fever, 156; scarlet fever, 26; diphtheria and croup, 305; measles, 76; and whooping cough, 156.

The Monthly Bulletin says:

The average daily mortality during the month has been 357, against 377 in July, there having been 600 fewer deaths. This decrease occurred entirely in the maritime district, the mortality having been greater in all other parts of the State than it was in July. Compared with August, 1894, the mortality is greater by 600, the increase having occurred in the maritime district, where there were 900 more deaths than last year. The decrease since July is in diarrheal diseases, which caused 2,300 deaths this month against nearly 3,000 in July; the mortality from this cause is greater than it was a year ago in the metropolis, but generally less elsewhere and notably in Buffalo and Rochester. One-fifth of the deaths during the month were from this cause, against one-fourth in July. From whooping cough there were 156 deaths, which is more than in any month of which we have record; more deaths uniformly occur from this cause in August than in any other month, the average for the past ten years being 120, against an average for the other months of the year of 77; July has had an average monthly mortality of 100. Its distribution is general. Measles caused but 4 deaths outside of the maritime district, and its increasing prevalence since March is being suspended. Diphtheria and scarlet fever, during the same period, have been decreasing and continue to. There were 50 more deaths from typhoid fever than in July, but the increase is not as great this year as last. Zymotic diseases caused 28 per cent of the deaths of this month, and excepting diarrheal diseases, 7.5 per cent. The mortality reported from diseases of the digestive and circulatory systems is high, and cancer caused a somewhat unusual number of deaths.

*Cholera Notes.*

[Translated in this Bureau from the "Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes," Berlin, Germany, September 18, 1895.]

*Austria-Hungary.*—During the period from September 3 to 9 there were 14 cholera cases, and 5 deaths in the town of Tarnopol. In the district of Tarnopol, from September 2 to 9, 3 cases, 1 death. At Wertelka, in the district of Brody, from September 1 to 2, 1 case, 1 death, and at Ohelnica, in the district of Rohatyn, on September 2, 4 deaths. In Tarnopol the epidemic is at present confined to the Podoli quarter, where the infected houses are closely crowded together.

*France.*—From September 1 to 7, 1 case of "choleriform affection" occurred in Paris.

*Great Britain.*—The 2 cases reported from Grimsby have been proved by bacteriological examination not to be Asiatic cholera.

*Russia.*—Cases and deaths are reported to the medical department as follows: In the Government of Volhynia, from August 4 to 10, 1,004 cases, 322 deaths; from August 11 to 17, 2,025 cases, 718 deaths; from August 18 to 24, 2,497 cases, 944 deaths; and from August 25 to 31, 3,352 cases, 1,190 deaths were officially reported from the districts of Ostrog, Kremenez, Saslaw, Starokonstantinow, Novogradwolynski, Dubno, Rowno, Luzk, Shitomir, and Kowel. Advices from the military lazaretto of September 9 give 2 cases and 1 death.

*Turkey.*—The epidemic in the vilayet of Brussa shows a slight decrease. In the city of Brussa from August 29 to September 1, 37 cases and 38 deaths were reported; in 4 localities of the vilayet, from August 24 to 30, 32 cases, 16 deaths. In the vilayet of Aleppo there were 38 cases and 19 deaths in 5 localities from August 23 to September 1; in the vilayet of Diarbekir, in 3 localities, from August 24 to September 1, 77 cases, 77 deaths; in the vilayet of Adana, from August 23 to 27, 1 case, 2 deaths.

*East India, Calcutta.*—From July 28 to August 3 there were 11 cholera deaths.

*Japan.*—The number of cases and deaths officially reported is as follows: From April 18 to 30, 99 cases, 28 deaths; in May, 665 cases, 514 deaths; in June, 3,573 cases, 1,931 deaths; in July, 7,575 cases, 4,891 deaths, and on August 1 and 2, 810 cases, 553 deaths; total, 12,722 cases, 7,917 deaths. The localities most seriously affected by the epidemic were the districts situated along the route to the military maneuver ground, in the southwestern part of the island. Osaka numbered 2,518 cases, 1,874 deaths; Hiogo, 1,102 cases, 583 deaths; Hiroshima, 1,424 cases, 916 deaths; Yamaguchi, 814 cases, 498 deaths; Fukuoka, 674 cases, 341 deaths. In Tokyo Fu, 847 cases, 517 deaths, were reported; at the military quarantine station, 964 cases, 473 deaths.

*Morocco.*—Advices of September 6 report several cases resembling cholera, and generally fatal, at Tangier. Their true character has not yet been determined.

*Plague.*

*Hongkong.*—From April 29 to August 6, 20 cases in all were reported.

## CURRENT QUARANTINE MEASURES.

[Translated in this Bureau from the "Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes," Berlin, September 18, 1895.]

*Cholera.*

*Austria-Hungary.*—Travelers from Russia are, as stated in the Austrian Sanitätswesen, page 350, subject to sanitary inspection at the frontier railway stations of Brody and Podwoloczyska. Passengers taking the train at Brody shall be accommodated in a separate section of the train.

*Norway.*—By official order of September 6, Asia Minor is declared to be infected with cholera.

*Turkey.*—Vessels carrying passengers from the line of coast between Cape Kelidonia and Sueidije shall, after September 3, be subject only to medical inspection in the first port provided with a sanitary officer. For other arrivals from the ports of Adalia the regulation requiring a five-days' quarantine remains in force.

*Spain.*—By ministerial proclamation of September 7 arrivals from Tangier carrying a clean bill, or a bill indicating suspicious sickness, shall be subject to at least three days' quarantine of observation. Arrivals on which cholera cases shall be found to exist shall be subject to regular quarantine.

*Plague.*

*Hongkong.*—Quarantine restrictions against the Island of Hainan were discontinued July 22; against Macao, July 30.

## BRAZIL.

*Sanitary Report of Rio de Janeiro.*

RIO DE JANEIRO, *September 10, 1895.*

SIR: I have the honor to transmit report for week ended September 7, 1895:

There were 7 deaths from *accessio pernicioso*, a decrease of 2; 7 from yellow fever, a decrease of 1; 81 from smallpox, an increase of 29; 2 from enteric fever, an increase of 1; 1 from whooping cough, the same as in the foregoing week; 1 from measles, a decrease of 3; none from diphtheria or scarlatina; and 57 from tuberculosis, an increase of 17. There were 411 deaths from all causes, which is an increase of 57 over the foregoing week.

*Yellow fever.*—There is nothing new to be said on this subject, as there are more or less the usual number of cases at this season of the year.

*Smallpox.*—The large increase in the number of deaths from this cause, I suppose may be attributed to the lower temperature, which always produces this result here amongst the least protected classes. As far as is possible for me to inform myself the number of cases has not increased. Telegrams from Victoria and Florianapolis state that the disease is rapidly declining in those ports.

The large increase in the total number of deaths is due to the small-

pox and the usual great number of deaths from diseases of the respiratory system, customary at this time of the year, when the weather is cool and moist and accompanied with strong southeasterly winds.

Since last report the following-named ships have been visited and inspected and received bills of health from this office. I have insisted on the vaccination of all on board before issuing the bills of health: September 4, Norwegian bark *Argentina*, for Pensacola, Fla.; September 5, Belgian steamship *Wordsworth*, for New York, N. Y.; British steamship *Horrox*, for New Orleans, La.

#### *Sanitary Inspection of certain Cuban Towns.*

HABANA, ISLAND OF CUBA, October 2, 1895.

SIR: Having reason to believe that yellow fever was appearing and increasing at some places on the south side of the island, on the 25th ultimo I requested Dr. Fortun to visit them, if possible, and inform me of their sanitary condition, and on October 1 he sent me his inclosed report, which translated, is as follows:

On Thursday, the 26th ultimo, according to your instructions, I took the steamer at Batabanó on the south coast to inspect the ports of Cienfuegos, Casilda, and Lunas de Zaza. We ought to have arrived at Cienfuegos that same night, but the steamer not only left Batabanó much behind time, but about five hours after leaving got aground, where she remained over twenty-four hours, so that we did not reach Cienfuegos until 10 o'clock Saturday night, two days behind time.

On Sunday I telegraphed you that there were 6 cases of yellow fever in Cienfuegos. One was in the private hospital, "Quinta de Dependientes," another in the private hospital of Dr. Lauda, 2 were in the civil-military hospital, and 2 were in the new military hospital which has been in the last month established here. Four of those cases were soldiers and 2 were clerks.

The new military hospital occupies a private house rented for that purpose, and has room for some thirty beds. It is well ventilated, and in very good order, the cleanliness of the beds, floors, walls, etc., contrasting most favorably with what is usually seen here in similar establishments, but the location is very bad, being on the west, and alongside of a stable and a horribly filthy drain. There were some eighteen patients, among whom were some wounded.

During the month, from August 26, there have occurred 99 deaths in Cienfuegos, 6 of them being caused by yellow fever, 10 by dysentery, 8 by pernicious fever, the rest by common diseases, tuberculosis causing many. Four of the deaths by yellow fever were in the battalion of about 1,000 troops which are in and around the city.

It seems strange that there have been comparatively so few cases of yellow fever in this jurisdiction this season so far, and I am at a loss how to account for it, for there has been no lack of hot weather and unacclimated troops here lately, conditions which ought to cause a much greater epidemic than was here two years ago.

There is but one foreign merchant vessel in the harbor, and that is a steamer of the Munson Line, with no sickness aboard.

The detention of the passenger steamer at Batabanó, with the fact of her being aground for over a day, prevented me from making a connection with the steamers to Casilda and Lunas de Zaza, so that I was obliged to return without visiting those ports. Nevertheless, I can inform you that I learned from a trustworthy person from Casilda and Trinidad that there are about 2,000 soldiers there, with 150 of them in the hospital.



This being the hurricane season, the best-planned tour of inspection may be interrupted and delays may occur, both on account of that and the unsettled state of the country in consequence of the insurrection.

##### *Reporting Cholera in Tangier—Quarantine Proclamation.*

GIBRALTAR, *September 20, 1895.*

According to the reports received to-day from Tangier, the number of deaths from cholera during the twenty-four hours ending at noon yesterday was 15, and the number of fresh attacks, 10.

*September 21, 1895.*

Twelve deaths from cholera were reported from Tangier during the twenty-four hours ending at noon yesterday, also 9 fresh attacks. There have been previously reported in Tangier and forwarded to the Gibraltar authorities : September, 15, 12 deaths, 2 new cases ; September, 16, 8 deaths, 6 new cases ; September 17, 19 deaths, 7 new cases ; September 18, 13 deaths, 12 new cases.

Clipping taken from one of the local daily papers of Gibraltar :

*Gibraltar, September 26, 1895.*—We hear that there has not been much improvement during the last day or two in the state of the public health in Tangier, but it is hoped that with the advent of the winter rains the epidemic will rapidly disappear.

It is rumored to-day that cases and deaths of the disease prevailing at Tangier have lately been declared at Tetuan. Fourteen days of quarantine observation have also been imposed upon arrivals from Tetuan.

#### JAPAN.

##### *The Epidemic of Cholera in Japan.*

YOKOHAMA, JAPAN, *September 16, 1895.*

SIR : I have the honor to inclose herewith a copy of the weekly report of cholera in Japan, furnished to me by the Department of home affairs and covering the whole country up to September 12. In forwarding this report I would call attention to the following facts :

- (1) That cholera has now existed in Japan for some five months.
- (2) That it has been very widely disseminated, chiefly by the troops and coolies returning from the seat of the late war, and is now, or has recently been, present in every province of the Empire.
- (3) That, in nearly every province there are many centers of infection, so that the total number of disease foci is very great.

(4) That the present epidemic is of a mortality higher than the average, the death rate for the whole country having, so far, ranged between 65 and 75 per cent, while, in certain districts, nearly every case has proved fatal.

(5) That, notwithstanding the unfavorable conditions mentioned in the foregoing, the disease, by most stringent measures on the part of the Japanese authorities, has been held in check in a manner and with a success which, so far as I know, is, all things considered, unprecedented.

(6) That a comparison of the inclosed, with preceding returns, affords some reason to hope that the epidemic has reached its acme, and that it is now declining in virulence.

AUSTRALIA—*Brisbane*.—Month of July, 1895. Estimated population, 93,657. Total deaths, 113, including phthisis pulmonalis, 10; and whooping cough, 3.

*Sydney*.—Month of July, 1895. Estimated population, 423,600. Total deaths, 829, including enteric fever, 4; scarlet fever, 2; diphtheria, 9; and whooping cough, 11.

CANADA—*Ontario—Hamilton*.—Month of September, 1895. Estimated population, 50,000. Total deaths, 81, including phthisis pulmonalis, 5; enteric fever, 4; scarlet fever, 3; and diphtheria, 3.

CUBA—*Habana*.—Under date of September 28, 1895, the United States sanitary inspector reports as follows:

There were 164 deaths in this city during the week ended September 26, 1895. Twenty-two of those deaths were caused by yellow fever, with 70 new cases approximately, 3 were caused by enteric fever, 5 by so-called pernicious fever, 1 by paludal fever, 4 by enteritis, 4 by dysentery, 1 by smallpox, 2 by pneumonia, and 1 by glanders. Six of the deaths by yellow fever occurred in the military hospital.

There were 650 deaths in this city during the month of September, 1895. One hundred and twenty-six of those deaths were caused by yellow fever, 10 by enteric fever, 25 by so-called pernicious fever, 5 by paludal fever, 2 by diphtheria, 17 by enteritis, 19 by dysentery, 7 by smallpox, 9 by pneumonia, and 2 by glanders. During the week ending October 3 there were 146 deaths, 29 of which were caused by yellow fever with approximately 90 new cases, 1 was caused by enteric fever, 5 by so-called pernicious fever, 1 by paludal fever, 2 by diphtheria, 3 by enteritis, 5 by dysentery, 2 by smallpox and 1 by glanders. Sixteen of the 29 deaths during the week caused by yellow fever occurred in the military hospital.

FRANCE—*Nice*.—Month of August, 1895. Estimated population, 97,720. Total deaths, 117, including phthisis pulmonalis, 15; enteric fever, 3; and diphtheria, 1.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales*.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended September 21, corresponded to an annual rate of 19.8 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,591,530. The lowest rate was recorded in Croydon, viz, 9.1, and the highest in Sunderland, viz, 32.9 a thousand.

*London*.—One thousand three hundred and forty-six deaths were registered during the week, including smallpox, 2; measles, 24; scarlet fever, 13; diphtheria, 37; whooping cough, 21; enteric fever, 21; diarrhea and dysentery, 109. The deaths from all causes corresponded to an annual rate of 16 a thousand. In greater London 1,718 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 14.8 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 16 from diphtheria.

*Ireland.*—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended September 21 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 21.6 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Sligo, viz, 10.2, and the highest in Galway, viz, 49.1 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 148 deaths were registered, including smallpox, 2; typhus fever, 2; enteric fever, 2; scarlet fever, 2; and whooping cough, 1.

*Scotland.*—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended September 21 corresponded to an annual rate of 18.5 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,500,435. The lowest mortality was recorded in Perth, viz, 10.3, and the highest in Greenoch, viz, 23.5 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 534, including scarlet fever, 4; measles, 3; diphtheria, 3; and whooping cough, 10.

*Dundee.*—Month of July, 1895. Estimated population, 160,163. Total deaths, 245, including phthisis pulmonalis, 31; scarlet fever, 1; whooping cough, 4; and croup, 1.

Month of August, 1895. Total deaths, 250, including phthisis pulmonalis, 31; enteric fever, 1; scarlet fever, 1; diphtheria, 3; measles, 2; croup, 1; and whooping cough, 14.

NOVA SCOTIA—*Windsor.*—Month of August, 1895. Estimated population, 3,000. Total deaths, 3. No deaths from contagious diseases.

ST. HELENA.—Four weeks ended August 31. Estimated population, 3,877. Total deaths, 7, including 1 from diphtheria.

SPAIN—*Barcelona.*—Month of August, 1895. Estimated population, 420,000. Total deaths, 497, including smallpox, 8; enteric fever, 18; and diphtheria, 6.
