SIR: Since my last report to you, January 23, 1895, I have to report the following cases of smallpox: One in Michigan City in the person of a sailor, source of disease not known; 2 in New Carlisle, contracted from one previously reported and in the same family; 1 in Roby, contracted in Chicago; 1 in Franklin in the person of a young man who had two weeks previously come from Chicago. All necessary precautions have been taken to prevent spread of disease.

ALABAMA—Mobile.—Month of January, 1895. Population, 31,076. Total deaths, 85, including enteric fever, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 12; and whooping cough, 1.

California—Los Angeles.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 75,000. Total deaths, 104, including phthisis pulmonalis, 18; enteric fever, 2; and diphtheria, 8.

Oakland.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 60,000. Total deaths, 63, including phthisis pulmonalis, 8; enteric fever, 2; scarlet fever, 2; and diphtheria, 1.

Sacramento.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 30,000. Total deaths, 38, including phthisis pulmonalis, 4; and scarlet fever, 1.

CONNECTICUT—Bridgeport.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 58,860. Total deaths, 77, including phthisis pulmonalis, 11; diphtheria, 8; croup, 1; and whooping cough, 1.

Hartford.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 58,000. Total deaths, 84, including phthisis pulmonalis, 10; enteric fever, 4; diphtheria, 1; and croup, 3.

Meriden.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 28,500. Total deaths, 28, including phthisis pulmonalis, 4; diphtheria, 1; and whooping cough, 2.

Illinois—Bloomington.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 25,000. Total deaths, 24, including 1 from diphtheria.

INDIANA—Evansville.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 60,000. Total deaths, 76, including phthisis pulmonalis, 10; enteric fever, 2; and croup, 2.

Iowa—Dubuque.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 40,000. Total deaths, 40, including phthisis pulmonalis, 1; scarlet fever, 1; croup, 4; and whooping cough, 2.

MASSACHUSETTS—Brockton.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 33,939. Total deaths, 46, including 7 from phthisis pulmonalis.

MICHIGAN.—Five weeks ended February 2, 1895. Reports to the State board of health from 278 observers. For the month of January, 1895, compared with the preceding month, pleuritis, influenza, and pneumonia increased, and erysipelas, diphtheria, and remittent fever decreased, in area of prevalence. Compared with the average for corresponding months in the nine years 1886–1894, erysipelas, intermittent fever, consumption, and pneumonia were less prevalent in January, 1895. Including reports by regular observers, and others, consumption was reported present in Michigan in the month of January, 1895, at 227 places, scarlet fever at 136, diphtheria at 84, typhoid fever at 69, measles at 25, and smallpox at 14. Reports from all sources show scarlet fever reported at 9 places more, typhoid fever at 5 places less, diphtheria at 1 place more, measles at 13 places more, and smallpox at 4 places more than in the preceding month.

Week ended February 2, 1895. Reports from 55 observers indicate that inflammation of kidney increased, and diphtheria decreased, in area of prevalence. Phthisis pulmonalis is reported present during the week at 227 places, scarlet fever at 58, diphtheria at 29, enteric fever at 24, measles at 11, and smallpox at 8 places—Bengal Township, Detroit, Haurtranck Township, Highland Park, Plymouth, Pontiae, Royal Oak Township, and Southfield Township.

MINNESOTA—St. Paul.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 155,000. Total deaths, 130, including phthisis pulmonalis, 5; enteric fever, 3; diphtheria, 4; croup, 4; and whooping cough, 2.

Winona.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 22,000. Total deaths, 26. No deaths from contagious diseases.

NEW YORK—Rochester.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 150,000. Total deaths, 228, including phthisis pulmonalis, 18; enteric fever, 2; diphtheria, 5; and whooping cough, 4.

NORTH CAROLINA.—Month of December, 1894. Reports to the State board of health from 27 towns, having an aggregate population of 139,604—white, 81,950; colored, 57,654—show a total of 160 deaths; white, 77; colored, 83. The deaths include phthisis pulmonalis, 38; enteric fever, 5; scarlet fever, 2; diphtheria, 1; and whooping cough, 1.

OHIO—Cincinnati.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated population, 336,000. Total deaths, 527, including phthisis pulmonalis, 67; enteric fever, 22; diphtheria, 12; and croup, 1.

## Current Quarantine Measures.

[Translated from the Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes, Berlin, January 23, 1895.

Prussia.—According to advices of January 5, the minister of public works has authorized the railroad officials at Bomberg, Breslau, Berlin, Altona, Erfurt, Frankfort on the Main, and Magdeburg to suspend the regulations against cholera importation. At the same time the authorities are directed to see that the said regulations are applied to crews of trains and depot employees who have been exposed to suspicious sickness.

Italy.—By ministerial order of January 4, Portugal, the Belgian and Dutch ports, and the German Baltic ports are declared free from cholera.

Norway.—By Government proclamation of January 10, West Prussia, the Netherlands, Bukowina, and the north coast of Asia Minor are declared free from cholera.

Portugal.—By ministerial order of January 8, the harbor of Rio de Janeiro and all other ports of the province of that name, are declared infected since December 20.

The quarantine measures previously reported as in force against the ports of Santos and the province of Sao Paulo were not directed against the outbreak of yellow fever in those ports, but against cholera.

Brazil.—According to advices of January 16 the German Baltic ports are declared clean. Vessels which left said ports on or after the 12th of January will be admitted to free pratique after stringent medical inspection.

#### TURKEY.

Cholera in Turkey.

(Report No. 113.)

Constantinople, January 16, 1895.

Cholera is abating in Adalia, as I stated in my last report. From the 7th to the 11th, 5 cholera deaths were reported in Adalia.

At Siverek, between Diarbekir and Oorfa, on the Euphrates, cholera cases have been observed, and from the 8th to the 14th instant 18 cholera deaths were officially reported. Sanitary and inland lazarrettos have again been established in order to prevent the spread of the disease in

Aleppo. The population of the Turkish Empire has already been ruined by sanitary cordons, but in spite of that sanitary cordons are established. In Constantinople deaths are constantly occurring which are to be attributed to cholera. I have already stated in my previous reports that among the soldiers some cholera cases have occurred. On the 9th instant, a street sweeper fell ill with diarrhea, vomiting, anuria, cramps, coldness of the limbs, and cyanosis, death occurring. The comma bacillus was found in the dejecta.

Smallpox always exists in the capital. During last December, 153 smallpox deaths were registered in Constantinople. From the 1st to the 14th instant 61 deaths from the same disease have been registered. With the exception of smallpox the general health of the capital is good.

The number of deaths registered during the month of last December was 1,213.

#### WEST INDIES.

Relative to Cases of Suspicious Fever at St. Christopher.

St. Christopher, West Indies, January 7, 1895.

SIR: I have the honor to make the following report: On the 31st ultimo Her Majesty's squadron, consisting of 4 vessels, arrived in this port from St. Lucia, West Indies. On Saturday morning, the 5th instant, a death occurred among one of the crew of the Volage, and the vessel was immediately ordered to sea, as the man was reported to have died from yellow fever. I went off to the Actne (flagship) to try and get official report, and learned that the man was taken ill on Friday night and died with the black vomit on Saturday, but there seemed to be diversity of opinion as to whether the man died of yellow jack or not. However, it appears that the man had not been ashore here since the arrival of his vessel.

All of the vessels put to sea on Monday morning, January 7, and there are a lot of wild rumors floating around as to the number of cases, etc., on board the ships, none of which have any foundation. The island of St. Christopher itself is quite healthy, and the chief object of this dispatch is to contradict any false reports which may reach the United States in regard to this affair.

CANADA—Ontario—Hamilton.—Month of January, 1895. Estimated

population, 50,000. Total deaths, 37, including phthisis pulmonalis, 5; scarlet fever, 1; diphtheria, 2.

CUBA-Havana.-Under date of February 2, 1895, the United States sanitary inspector reports as follows:

There were 590 deaths in this city during the month of January, 395. Thirteen of those deaths were caused by yellow fever, 9 by enteric fever, 8 by so-called pernicious fever, 4 by paludal fever, 5 by diphtheria, 25 by enteritis, 9 by dysentery, 4 by smallpox, 11 by the grippe, 23 by pneumonia, and 4 by glanders.

During the week ending January 31 there were 119 deaths, 4 of which were caused by yellow fever, with approximately 10 new cases; 2 were caused by enteric fever, 2 by so called pernicious fever, 3 by paludal fever, 2 by diphtheria, 5 by enteritis, 1 by dysentery, 1 by smallpox, 2 by the grippe, and 5 by pneumonia.

Under date of February 9, 1895, the United States sanitary inspector reports as follows:

There were 128 deaths in that city during the week ended February 7, One of those deaths was caused by yellow fever, with 4 new cases approximately; 1 was caused by enteric fever, 3 by so-called pernicious fever, 3 by diphtheria, 8 by enteritis, 3 by dysentery, 3 by smallpox, 1 by the grippe, and 6 by pneumonia.

France—Nice.—Month of September, 1894. Population, 78,482. Total deaths, 190, including phthisis pulmonalis, 9; diphtheria and croup, 4; and measles, 4.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended January 26 corresponded to an annual rate of 18.7 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,591,530. The lowest rate was recorded in Leicester, viz, 11.3, and the highest in Liverpool, viz, 28.0 a thousand.

London.—One thousand four hundred and eighty-one deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 21; scarlet fever, 7; diphtheria, 29; whooping cough, 27; enteric fever, 16; and diarrhea and dysentery, 10. The deaths from all causes corresponded to an annual rate of 17.6 a thousand. In greater London 1,927 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 16.6 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 15 from diphtheria, 7 from whooping cough, and 4 from measles.

Hull.—Two weeks ended December 29, 1894. Population, 212,679. Total deaths, 155, including smallpox, 1; scarlet fever, 2; diphtheria, 2; measles, 7; and whooping cough, 2.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended January 26 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 29.7 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Kilkenny, viz, 18.9, and the highest in Lurgan, viz, 59.3 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 208 deaths were registered. including smallpox, 7; enteric fever, 5; scarlet fever, 2; diphtheria, 1; and whooping cough, 2.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended January 26 corresponded to an annual rate of 24.2 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,500,435. The lowest mortality was recorded in Leith, viz, 19.2, and the highest in Glasgow, viz, 27.3 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 698, including smallpox, 2; measles, 42; scarlet fever, 9; diphtheria, 5; and whooping cough, 18.

GUIANA—Parimaribo.—Month of October, 1894. Estimated population, 29,231. Total deaths, 66, including 1 from leprosy.

INDIA—Singapore.—Month of November, 1894. Estimated population, 56,000. Total deaths, 505, including smallpox, 1; and beriberi, 28.

Jamaica—Kingston.—Month of December, 1894. Estimated population, 19,264. Total deaths, 96, including phthisis pulmonalis, 12; and enteric fever, 2.

RUSSIA—Riga.—Month of November, 1894. Estimated population, 215,000. Total deaths, 313, including phthisis pulmonalis, 41; enteric fever, 1; smallpox, 2; scarlet fever, 6; measles, 1; and whooping cough, 3.
