

37 families (40%) were re-contacted; 54 females were recruited

(27 primary intervention study targets + 27 new consented siblings)

* Families followed and not followed did not differ on poverty, sibling status, parental education, race/ethnicity, baseline parenting practices. These patterns were consistent across conditions.

29 female (from 20 families) 12 targeted children & 17 siblings consented

Analytical sample by research question:

- Intervention effect on Perceptions of Dating Violence (i.e., Violence Norms, Dating Violence Prevalence, Peer Dating Violence): All females, <u>n</u>=29
- **2)** Intervention effect on violence sanction: limited to participants who reported involvement in any dating relationship since age 10; <u>n</u>=21 (from 16 families)
- **3)** Intervention effect on IPV (perpetration/victimization): limited to participants who reported involvement in a dating relationship within past year; <u>n</u>=20

25 female (from 17 families) 15 targeted children & 10 siblings consented

Analytical sample by research question:

- Intervention effect on Perceptions of Dating Violence (i.e., Violence Norms, Dating Violence Prevalence, Peer Dating Violence): All females, <u>n</u>=23
- 2) Intervention effect on violence sanction: limited to participants who reported involvement in any dating relationship since age 10; $\underline{n}=16$ (from 11 families)
- **3)** Intervention effect on IPV (perpetration/victimization): limited to participants who reported involvement in a dating relationship within past year; <u>n</u>=15
