

- <sup>¶</sup> Limitations in IADLs are based on response to the question, "Because of a physical, mental, or emotional problem, does [person] need the help of other persons in handling routine needs, such as everyday household chores, doing necessary business, shopping, or getting around for other purposes?" Respondents were asked to answer regarding themselves and other family members living in the same household.

In 2012, the percentages of adults with limitations in activities of daily living (ADLs) and limitations in instrumental activities of daily living (IADLs) increased with age. Adults aged  $\geq$ 75 years were the most likely to require the help of another person with ADLs and with IADLs.
